The exhibition (a solo show by Koki Tanaka organized by The Japan Foundation) in the Japan Pavilion at the 55th Venice Biennale's International Art Exhibition has been awarded a Special Mention.

The Koki Tanaka - abstract speaking - sharing uncertainty and collective acts exhibition consists of videos and photographs by a group of people who joined forces to capture a common subject. Though the theme of the event is the Great East Japan Earthquake, this is not immediately evident. After seeing people walking up and expressing a sense of resistance, however, viewers gradually realize that the exhibition poses the question of how we might work together to create a new society in the wake of such the disaster.

Many guests, including his Excellency Masaharu Kono, Ambassador of Japan to Italy, assembled for the opening of the Japan Pavilion (held one day before the grand opening of the biennale). The event was greeted with much interest. At 11:00AM on June 1, 2013 (local time), the recipients of this year's prizes were announced in tandem with the official opening of the biennale. Among this year's winners is the Japan Pavilion, which has been awarded a Special Mention.

The Japanese Pavilion also received a prize (Golden Lion) in the Architecture Exhibition at last year's Venice Biennale for an event that also focused on the Great East Japan Earthquake. In the past, a number of other Japanese artists, including Masuo Ikeda (1966), Hiroshi Senju (1995), and Yoko Ono (2009), have also won prizes in the International Art Exhibition.
